Publication users

NEBOSH Health and Safety Management for Construction (UK) has been accredited and credit rated by the Scottish Qualifications Authority (SQA) Accreditation at SCQF Level 7 with 12 SCQF credit points. SCQF Level 7 is comparable to RQF/CQFW Level 4 in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

Scope and contents

Topics covered by the guide include:

- Improving health and safety culture and assessing risk.
- Managing change and procedures.
- Identification of workplace hazards and methods of risk control.

Reference is made to the harm that construction hazards may have and the prevalence of injuries they cause in the construction industry. The publication contains an emphasis on practical solutions to construction workplace health and safety issues.

Full colour photographs, tables and sample documents are provided to enable an understanding of how these risks can be managed.
